What Didn't Pass

Key Issues That Did Not Pass

- Elimination of Civil Asset Forfeiture
- Removing open records exemption for investigatory records
- Firearms
 - Lowering CCH age to 18
 - Restoring College/University ability to ban CCH on campus/in campus buildings
 - Bump stock ban
 - Red Flag/Extreme Risk Protection Order
 - Making possession of firearm by felon presumptive imprisonment



What Didn't Pass

Key Issues That Did Not Pass

- Drugs
 - Repeal of 3rd offense drug possession special rule
 - · Immunity when reporting drug overdose
 - Legalization of Marijuana
- <u>Transferring most child</u> <u>abuse/neglect cases from DCF to</u> <u>Local LE</u>
- Negligent driving
- Expungement and purging of arrest record upon acquittal



Criminal Law

Weapons KSA 21-6301

- Unlawful possession of firearm
- Misdemeanor DV Conviction
 - Protection Orders
 - Fugitive from Justice
 - Illegally in US

HB2145 Effective: 5/3/18 SL Ch: 61

- Silencers excluded if made in KS and remain in KS
- Throwing stars only illegal to possess if intent to use against another

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Criminal Law

- Swatting
- HB2581 Effective: 7/1/18 SL Ch: 45
- Resulting in death SL1 P Felony
 - Great Bodily Injury SL4 P Felony
 - Injury SL6 P Felony
- Counterfeiting
 - Same as federal counterfeiting of US currency, note or obligation
 - \$25k or more SL7 NP Felony
 - \$25k or less SL8 NP Felony

Criminal Law

- Escape and Agg. Escape: Adds fail to return from authorized leave
- Unlawful Sexual Relations includes LEO engaging in consensual sex with a person age 16 or over during traffic stop, custodial interrogation, investigative interview, or while person is detained

Drug Laws

- Marijuana Definition Exemptions
 - Amended in both criminal and controlled substance statutes
 - Cannabidiol in CBD products
 - Must have no THC or other illegal substances in product
 - Hemp possessed as allowed by the Agricultural Hemp law
- THC possession penalties same as possession of marijuana



Drug Laws

- Drug Schedules:
 - Schedule I: added synthetic opioids, MT-45 (opioid analgesic), new synthetic cannabis
 - Schedule II: Added a fentanyl precursor
 - Schedule III: Updated list of anabolic steroids

SB282 Effective: 5/24/18 SL Ch: 101 Dronabinol, a THC Synthetic was moved from Schedule IV to Schedule III



DUI

- Criminal violation for refusing evidentiary test repealed
- Statute on preliminary test unchanged
- Amendments primarily based on case law from past three years

SB374 Effective: 7/1/18 SL Ch: 106



DUI

- DUI with child in car (8-1567)
 - Driver 18+ yoa
 - Child under age 18
- Vehicle operated by person under 21 with alcohol and/or drugs in system remains in place (8-1001):
- SB374 Sy Effective: 7/1/18

SL Ch: 106

- Requires PC of age and alcohol/drug in system, <u>AND</u>
 - arrested for a DUI offense; \underline{or}
 - involved in motor vehicle accident

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Alcohol Laws

Hours of Sale

HB2470 Effective: 5/24/18 SL Ch: 99

- Venues, clubs, drinking establishments sales, serving, and mixing prohibited from 2 AM to 6 AM
- Farm wineries, winery outlets, microbreweries, and microdistilleries hours of sale on Sundays for off-premise consumption changed to 6 AM to Midnight

 Strong beer sales in certain cities opting for other hours on Sunday same as hours for

HB2502 Effective: 7/1/18 SL Ch: 8



Alcohol Laws

- Candy with alcohol regulated by ABC
 - Definition of "alcoholic liquor" amended to include "alcoholic candy"
 - Manufacturing if more than 0.5% alcohol by weight

HB2470 Effective: 5/24/18 SL Ch: 99

 Retail sale if more than 1% alcohol by weight



Juveniles

- Case Length Limits
 - Time while juvenile has absconded from supervision does not apply to case limits
 - If juvenile fails to appear for dispositional hearing time until juvenile brought before court for disposition is not applied to case limits

HB2454 Effective: 7/1/18 SL Ch: 52



Juveniles

- Detention Hearings
 - Juvenile may waive 14-day detention hearing
 - Audio/Video appearance allowed at any detention hearing
 - If juvenile in detention, sentencing hearing must be no later than 45-days after adjudication.

Juveniles

Juvenile Crisis Intervention Act

- Establishes authority to operate local Juvenile Crisis Intervention Centers.
- Does not require jurisdictions or CMHC to establish one.
- For short-term (up to 30 days)
 mental health treatment of a
 juvenile suffering from a mental
 health crisis and is deemed to be
 likely to cause harm to self or others

SB179 Effective: 7/1/18 SL Ch: 107

May not be located in a jail or juvenile detention facility



Juveniles Juvenile Crisis Intervention Act

- · Admission requires
 - Community Mental Health Center written authorization;
 - Determination by Juvenile Crisis
 Intervention Center the juvenile is in need of treatment <u>and</u> is likely to cause harm to self or others, <u>and</u>;

SB179 Effective: 7/1/18 SL Ch: 107

 No other appropriate alternative treatment is available and accessible at the time of admission



Juveniles

- CINC Custody by Law Enforcement
 - Required if officer has reason to believe child is having mental health crisis and is likely to cause harm to self or others (KSA 38-2231).
 - The child may not be placed in a juvenile detention center or other secure facility.

SB179 Effective: 7/1/18 SL Ch: 107



Juveniles

New placement option for juvenile offender in mental crisis

- Juvenile Crisis Intervention Center
 - Must not score high enough on risk assessment for detention
 - Must have CMHC Center and Crisis Center approval

SB179 Effective: 7/1/18 SL Ch: 107 · All other existing options remain



Juveniles Newborn Infant Protection Act

- Maximum Infant Age Changed from 45 days to 60 days
- Infants delivered to a non-medical facility must arrange for immediate transportation to a medical facility
- Medical care facilities required to provide standard of care treatment

SB179 Effective: 7/1/18 SL Ch: 107



Juveniles Newborn Infant Protection Act

- Immunity from criminal, civil and administrative liability for facilities and employees receiving child, provided:
 - No negligent or intentional acts or omission of acts

SB179 Effective: 7/1/18 SL Ch: 107 Extends to medical facility and employees receiving child from another receiving facility



Juveniles Newborn Infant Protection Act

- Immunity from criminal and civil liability for relinquishing parent, provided infant was:
 - Delivered safely to physical custody of an employee of a listed facility
 - No more than 60 days old when delivered to a listed facility

SB179 Effective: 7/1/18 SL Ch: 107

 Not abused or neglected by the relinquishing parent prior to delivering the child to a listed facility.



Juveniles Newborn Infant Protection Act

- Defines "Relinquishing Parent" and "Non-Relinquishing Parent"
- Relinquishing parent implies:
 - Voluntary relinquishment of parental rights
 - To allowing adoption of the infant

SB179 Effective: 7/1/18 SL Ch: 107 Non-relinquishing parent has 30 days after receiving notice to seek preserving their parental rights.



Law Enforcement Procedure

Criminal Assets Forfeiture

- Retains civil forfeiture
- Forfeited funds distribution unchanged
- Requires seizing officer to complete PC affidavit

HB2549 Effective: 7/1/18 SL Ch: 26

- Adopts federal expenditure rules
- · Centralized data reporting

Law Enforcement Procedure

- Body Cam/Car Cam Video
 - Persons who are allowed to view video
 - Subject of video
 - Both parents of juvenile
 - · When death occurs heir at law
 - Attorney for any of the above

SB336 Effective: 7/1/18 SL Ch: 87

- For required viewing when requested by listed persons within 20 days
- Judicial Council will study over interim

Law Enforcement Procedure

- Policy must be in place by July 1, 2018
 - Eye witness identification
 - Recording of certain interrogations

Protecting Victims

- Protection orders available for victims of human trafficking, agg human trafficking, commercial exploitation of child, or selling sexual relations
- If juvenile, can be requested by
 - Family member
 - Household member
 - Court appointed custodian or guardian
 - County/District Attorney
 - Attorney General



Protecting Victims

- Protection from stalking or sexual assault orders for juvenile victims can be requested by
 - Family member
 - Household member
 - Court appointed custodian or guardian

SB281 Effective: 7/1/18 SL Ch: 110





Protecting Victims

- Protection from abuse orders for juvenile victims can be requested by
 - Family member
 - Household member
 - Court appointed custodian or guardian

SB281 Effective: 7/1/18 SL Ch: 110



Protecting Victims

- Protection orders and cell phone accounts
 - Orders can include the transfer of current phone numbers of petitioner and/or the petitioner's children to the petitioner
 - Applies to Protection from Abuse, or Protection from Stalking, Sexual Assault, or Human Trafficking

Protecting Victims


- · Identity theft: Credit report freeze
 - Consumer reporting agencies are prohibited from charging a fee for security freeze services
 - A child under age 16 security freezes may be requested by guardian or conservator with no charge
 - Applies to everyone, not just identity theft victims
- Wrongfully convicted compensation



Rescue of Person or Animal from Vehicle

- No criminal or civil liability for damage to vehicle if reasonable
- Person must
 - Notify law enforcement or 911
 - Remain with rescued person until law enforcement arrives
